Threat Vector #1: Oversharing



- 72% of teens have a social networking profile and nearly half (47%) have a public profile viewable by anyone. (Cox Communications Teen Online and Wireless Safety Survey)
- 26% of teens know someone who something bad has happened to because of information or photos posted online. (Cox Communications Teen Online and Wireless Safety Survey)
- One out of five teens reported that they have electronically sent or posted online, nude or seminude pictures or videos of themselves (Council on Communications & Media, 2011)

Threat Vector #2: Online Predators



According to a 2010 study published in the Journal of Adolescent Health:

- · In 82% of online sex crimes against minors, the offender used the victim's social networking site to gain information about the victim's likes and
- 65% of online sex offenders used the victim's social networking site to gain home and school information about the victim.
- 26% of online sex offenders used the victim's social networking site to gain information about the victim's whereabouts at a specific time.

Threat Vector #2: Online Predators, continued



According to a 2010 study published in the Journal of Adolescent Health:

- 14 percent of students in 10th-12th grade have accepted an invitation to meet an online stranger in-person and 14 percent of students, have invited an online stranger to meet them in-person.
- Nine percent of children in 7th-9th grade have accepted an online invitation to meet someone inperson and 10 percent have asked someone online to meet them in-person.

According to the Pew Internet and American Life Survey in 2011:

- 95% of social media-using teens who have witnessed cruel behavior on social networking sites say they have seen others ignoring the mean behavior; 55% witness this frequently
- Only 7% of U.S. parents are worried about cyberbullying, even though 33% of teenagers have been victims of cyberbullying
- 66% of teens who have witnessed online cruelty have also witnessed others joining in; 21% say they have also joined in the harassment

5 Things You Must Do As A Parent in the Digital Age



- 1. Educate yourself know how to use
- privacy settings and parental controls Start young talk your kids about safety not just "stranger danger" but also how to handle online bullying
- Set clear rules and expectations keep computer in plain view, have access
- Be their parent AND their Facebook "friend"
- Most important thing is that they know that they can come to you
